FINANCIAL AID & AFFORDABILITY

For Fall 2023, the Office of Scholarships & Financial Aid (OSFA) has disbursed over \$336M in aid to over 35,000 students. This includes federal and institutional grants, merit- and need-based scholarships, and student and parent loans. OSFA continues to expand their events, outreach, support, and resources to help students make informed decisions about paying for college and investing in their future



RECORD ENROLLMENT

The University of Arizona welcomed one of the largest and most diverse classes in university history including a record number of Arizona students – with 9,178 first-year students. This year's first-year enrollment surpasses last year's historically large class and is almost 8% higher than the 2021 incoming class. The university received a record number of first-year applicants, about 56,466. This year's first-year students are the most diverse incoming class, with 49% self-identifying as ethnicities other than white. That is up from 47% last year and 46% in 2021. Native American firstyear student enrollment increased 22% over last year. The university also saw a **10% increase in incoming** students who identify as Black or African American, and a 7% increase in students who identify as Hispanic or Latinx. Students who self-identify as first-generation students make up about 30% of the university's incoming class, a slight increase over 2022 and 2021.

This year's incoming class is also one of the most academically prepared, with an average unweighted core academic high school GPA of 3.58. The class includes about 1.200 W.A. Franke Honors College students, 85 National Merit Scholars, 172 National Hispanic Scholars and 10 Flinn Scholars – the most Flinn Scholars of any university in the state. All 50 states and 100 countries are represented in this year's incoming class. Enrollment of Arizona residents is a priority and the university saw a 68% increase over last year in first-year student enrollment from Rincon High School and a 60% increase from Flowing Wells High School. There was a 36% increase in enrollment from Rio Rico High School and a 56% increase in first-year students from Chaparral High School. The high number of in-state first-year students is the result of a deliberate effort to serve local and state high school students and Arizona's investment in the Arizona Promise program.

Beginning in spring 2023, the Arizona Promise Grant, which ensures that tuition and mandatory fees are fully covered, has been expanded to Arizona residents who qualify for any amount of Pell Grant and meet other eligibility requirements. Together with the Arizona Native Scholars Grant, which covers the same costs for Native students who are enrolled members of one of Arizona's 22 federally recognized Tribes, almost 2,500 students have been awarded for 2023-24.

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STUDENT SUCCESS & RETENTION

Helping students stay enrolled and working towards their degree is a collective effort. This past year, Student Success & Retention Innovation (SSRI) has witnessed the impact of campus-wide collaborations and partnerships; the university achieved a First-Time Full-Time retention rate of 87.7%, making it the university's highest rate ever. The sustained efforts of departments across campus will continue to support the success of these students moving forward, as well as the university's new 2023 first-year students.

The Student Success District (SSD), which opened last year, created welcoming spaces that focus on holistic success resources for all students. By co-locating multiple student support units, the SSD provides an interconnected student experience. This past year SSRI departments, many located in the SSD, directly supported students through over 135,000 visits: workshops, tutoring sessions, community-building events, peer-mentoring meetings, advising and coaching appointments, and other student support programming.

ARIZONA ONLINE

Arizona Online is widely recognized as a national leader in online education, ranking in the Top Ten of U.S. News & World Report's Best Online Bachelor's Programs three years in a row. Offering six start dates, Arizona Online is there for learners when they are ready to embark on their educational journey. Its mission is to transcend the traditional barriers of access, geography and cost to provide learners an opportunity to earn a prestigious education from Arizona's flagship university - from anywhere.

Arizona Online specializes in serving post-traditional learners including 85% who work while pursuing their degree, 73% transfer students (based on admit type), 55% identifying as first-generation, 42% who have children to care for, 33% who are Pell eligible, and 27% who are military-connected.

Arizona Online continues to grow, while focusing on a quality educational experience. Serving both undergraduates and graduate students, Arizona Online has 9,164 students enrolled in Fall 2023, not including those that will enroll in the second Fall session. Since last year, enrollment has grown by almost 13%, making this another record-setting year for Arizona Online enrollment. At 70%, Arizona Online also boasts one of the highest First-Time Full-Time retention rates in the nation for online programs.

ARIZONA INTERNATIONAL

At census Fall 2023, international enrollments across all modalities and locations grew to 5,579*, a 6% increase over the prior period, with a diverse student cohort of 128 nationalities. Projected growth across the global network of Microcampus and online programs will reach a total of 6,864 for international enrollment by October 15, 2023.

Strong demand for the University of Arizona is demonstrated by Fall 2023 main campus application growth of 36% (undergraduate) and 22% (graduate) year-over-year, and total new to main campus international enrollments grew to 992 for Fall 2023, a 10% increase over Fall 2022 census. The Global Microcampus Network has grown to ten countries and 15 locations, with enrollments estimated to be 2,600 by the end of the semester, a 32% increase year-over-year.
